ADDITIONAL LEARNING NEEDS PROVISION

COED GLAS PRIMARY SCHOOL

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN in accordance with Section 42 of the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 and the School Organisation Code, that Cardiff Council (herein after “the Authority”), having consulted such persons as appeared to them to be appropriate, propose to alter Coed Glas Primary School, Ty Glas Avenue, Llanishen, Cardiff, CF14 5DW as follows:

- establish a 20 place Specialist Resource Base for Autism at Coed Glas Primary School, within the existing buildings.

It is proposed to implement the proposal from September 2024.

The school hosts a specialist resource base for children with a hearing impairment. No changes are proposed to the school’s specialist resource base for learners with a hearing impairment.

The school is currently maintained by Cardiff Council.

The Authority undertook a period of consultation before deciding to publish this proposal. A consultation report containing a summary of the issues raised by consultees and the Authority’s responses and the views of Estyn on the proposed change is available to view at:

The current school capacity is 525 places for children aged 4-11. There are 112 nursery places. The current number of pupils at the school is 446 (4 – 11) and 59 (nursery aged).

There are no plans to change the Council’s policy on the admission of children to schools as a result of these proposals.

Admissions to the specialist resource base would be managed by the local authority and be subject to an Individual Development Plan (IDP).

Admissions to the specialist resource base would be separate to admission to the main school and would be in addition to the Published Admission Number (PAN).

Any arrangements for the transport of pupils will be made in accordance with the Authority's existing policies on school transport.

Within a period of 28 days of the date of publication of these proposals, that is to say by 07 May 2024, any person may object to these proposals.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This does not form part of the Notice but is intended to explain its general meanings)

Cardiff Council is committed to the principles of inclusion. The majority of learners with Additional Learning Needs (ALN) attend a local mainstream school, and benefit from effective Additional Learning Provision (ALP). These learners do not need to attend a special school or specialist resource base.

However, it is recognised that in order to thrive and fulfil their potential, children and young people with the most complex additional learning needs require access to the specialist environments and expertise of a special school or specialist resource base. The number of pupils with severe and complex needs, who need a place in a special school or specialist resource base has continued to grow.

The Council is committed to further developing and increasing provision for primary age learners with complex learning needs and/or autism.

In addition to the proposal for Coed Glas Primary School, proposals to establish specialist resource bases at Greenway Primary School and Severn Primary School are being progressed.

In relation to emotional health and wellbeing needs, proposals to establish specialist resource bases at Baden Powell Primary School, Fairwater Primary School, Herbert Thompson Primary School, Lakeside Primary School and Springwood Primary School are being progressed. The proposed expansion of Ysgol Cynefin (formerly known as The Court Special School) which provides Emotional Health and Wellbeing places for primary aged pupils is also being progressed. For secondary age pupils, proposals to establish a specialist resource base at Ysgol Gyfun Gymraeg Plasmawr are being progressed.
